CHAIRMAN'S REPORT



Chippewa Valley Electric Cooperative

WARNING: Recent studies indicate the common bath towel is the leading cause of dry skin!

Is it me or does it seem like there are more and more things to worry about or take

precautions against? Some are serious and some, like the example above, are not, but all can add to our daily load of concerns. That's why the board and staff are determined to deliver the power, products, and services you need from your cooperative in a stable, reliable, and trustworthy manner.

Safety

- We educate, train, and promote the safe use of electricity to our members through our national, state, and regional affiliations. The goal is to make safety second nature.
- We provide handson demonstrations to area schools, police, fire, and EMS departments, and county and township highway departments.



Reliability

- 2021 posted the lowest outage time per account in the co-op's history at 0.89 hrs/acct. An outage time of under one hour per account is difficult to accomplish, especially with the December 16 windstorm that knocked so many of you out of power. Crews were out all night and past 11 p.m. the next day in some pretty nasty weather.
- This has been a long-term effort with aggressive tree trimming, line relocation, and system connectivity for back feeding lines.



• The new outage management system allows us to dispatch our crews and plan restoration procedures much quicker.

 Our well-trained and equipped staff is stationed in your community. This means local help for storms, trouble, and questions.

Value and Price Stability

• No rate increase is planned for 2022. There was no rate increase in 2019 and 2021, and only a 1% increase in 2020. Electricity remains a stable value.



- As in 2020, the board declared a rate reduction credit in August. This one was even larger at over \$35 per average account.
- The board continues to increase the retirement of Capital Credits—over \$780,000 in 2021.

Beyond Electrons

• Working hard to bridge the digital divide in our rural communities, CVEC partnered with Citizens Connected to form Ntera, a high-speed fiber internet company that now has almost 1,200 customers.



- We offer money-saving rebates and rate structures to our membership. We offer rebates on energy-efficient products, electric vehicle charging stations, and storage heat, to name a few.
- We give back to the community through support of area organizations, Operation Round-Up, and scholarships to area high school students.

This year Chippewa Valley Electric Cooperative holds its 85th Annual Membership Meeting on Saturday, March 26, and we would love to see you there!

As always, we are very thankful for the support our members have for their local cooperative. We look forward to providing dependable electricity for years to come and continuing to invest in the future and communities we serve.

ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES 2021

The 84th annual meeting of the members of Chippewa Valley Electric Cooperative was called to order by Board Chairman John Petska at 10:01 a.m. in the cooperative office in the City of Cornell, Wisconsin, on Saturday, March 27, 2021.

Recognition All military veterans were asked to stand and were thanked for their service.

Invocation Reverend Dr. James Brandli prayed for the country, state, membership, and employees of CVEC.

Early Bird Prize The Early Bird prize of a 55" Samsung 4K UHD 4K Smart TV was won by Robert Peterson.

Introduction John Petska introduced the board. Candis Homme was recognized and presented with flowers for her retirement after serving on the board for six years. She considered it an honor and said she has seen a lot of changes over the years. She said CVEC management was top of the line. Clyde Shipman and Deone Goettl were recognized with 25-year service pins. Vern Weeks, Sue Hartzell, and Mary Colbenson were introduced as the tellers counting the ballots.

QUOTUM The board chairman declared a quorum was present and opened the meeting for business.

Notice and Affidavit of Mailing Secretary-Treasurer Clyde Shipman read the Notice of Meeting and Affidavit of Mailing.

Minutes The minutes of the 2020 meeting were mailed to the members prior to the meeting. The motion was made and seconded to approve the minutes as written. The motion carried.

Chairman's Report John Petska talked about wholesale power rates and assured rates are fair for everyone. He discussed the software system upgrade last year.

Round Table

President's Report: President and CEO Dean Ortmann said the co-op is 84 years strong. He said that 2020 was a tough year for many members. \$800,000 was returned to members through capital credits. Since costs were less than anticipated members received a rate credit; the average credit was \$30 per account. There is no projected rate increase for this year. The year 2020 had the third-lowest outage totals.

Financial Report: June Bach, office manager, discussed the financials of the co-op. She talked about the operating expenses and margins and discussed the assets and liabilities.

Member Services Report: Russ Falkenberg, director of IT & member services, discussed Ntera and Ntera grants. Ntera is growing in all directions and currently has \$10 million in assets—nothing beats fiber. Russ said that geothermal is the most efficient way to heat, with the co-op currently

offering \$800/ton rebates towards installation. Russ discussed dual fuel, load management, energy conservation, and peak alert.

Operations Dept. Report: Nic Alberson, operations manager, introduced Kevin Scheidler as the new line superintendent and Trevin Jensen as the new lineman following Robert Wruck's retirement after 37 years. New services were at a 13-year high. Nic reported on a list of completed projects and talked about right-of-way clearing and the tornado that hit the village of Cadott. A line straightening video was played showing the fact that not all work is done from the truck. Nic talked about the new SCADA system, outage notifications, and the outage map.

Prize Drawings Prizes were given to many members throughout the meeting.

QUESTIONS Dean Ortmann, president and CEO, and John Behling, legal counsel, addressed questions from the member audience. There were none.


