LEADERSHIP CHANGE AT CVEC

he board of directors of Chippewa Valley Electric Cooperative (CVEC) have named Russell Falkenberg, Jr. as the cooperative's new president/CEO. Falkenberg the eighth person to lead CVEC in the cooperative's 86-year

"On behalf of the board of directors, I'm proud to announce the selection of Falkenberg as president and CEO

of CVEC," said John Petska, chairman of the cooperative's board of directors. "Russ is member-focused with a deep understanding of cooperative values and is a proven leader. As a board, we feel we have found the right person to lead CVEC into the future."

Falkenberg was hired by CVEC in 2006 as a member services technician/electrician leading the load management program. He was promoted to member services director in 2010, adding director of IT to his title in 2016. He has over 30

years of experience managing IT-related projects, including the design of the cooperative's headquarters, development of communication systems to substations, and the implementation of an enhanced metering system.

Falkenberg has also been instrumental in the development and startup of Ntera, the cooperative's Fiber-Fast internet services provider formed in 2017 by the joint

venture of CVEC and Citizens Connected. Ntera has offered the successful deployment of broadband services to co-op members and the surrounding community.

"I am honored to be chosen by the board of directors to be the next leader of CVEC," Falkenberg said. "I look forward to working with our talented CVEC team as we continue to provide reliable electric service and cooperative programs to our members. I am thankful for Dean Ortmann's leadership the past many years. He has been an invaluable asset while maintaining the strong financial standing at the cooperative. I wish him the best as he begins his retirement years."

As of April 1, after 31 years at CVEC, president/CEO Dean Ortmann has retired. Ortmann started at CVEC in February

1991 as an accountant. He was promoted to office manager in 2000 and served as president/CEO since July of 2016.

"Dean has been a wise leader and financial expert at CVEC, continually leading the co-op in the right direction," said John Petska, board chair. "He never lost sight of the members. At every board meeting he reminded us that the co-op belongs to the members: it's theirs. Make decisions about the future for them and for the good of the employees. He kept his attention on the co-op's vision statement: to provide reliable electrical

services at competitive rates, while focusing on member satisfaction and employee safety. Dean has consistently made the right decisions for the cooperative and we are thankful for his many years of dedicated service to CVEC."

In addition, Ortmann

kept safety at the forefront. Ongoing training of safe workplace practices for employees and promoting education to the community through the co-op's high-voltage safety demonstration to local schools and first responders were important to him. He is credited with enrolling CVEC into the Rural Electric Safety Achievement Program (RESAP), a program that utilizes a framework for continuous improvement of safety performance and culture. He also prioritized continued educational opportunities for employees and directors.

Ortmann kept his eye on the future and new technologies that would strengthen the cooperative's electric infrastructure. He rallied the support of the board to understand the importance of forming Ntera and the advancements it would bring to the community and cooperative. Ntera's direct fiber connection to the co-op's substations and circuit switches provides reliable communication with CVEC equipment. Under his direction, CVEC's Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) system was added to the work plan and brought to life. The real-time monitoring and efficient resolution of system issues is unparalleled and will carry the cooperative into the future.

In retirement, Ortmann says he plans to "Do as little as possible for as long as possible. Please send cheese puffs."



To know Keith is to understand his love of fishing. He and his wife, Wanda, spend every summer in Washburn taking their boat out on Lake Superior to fish. "Keith was not just a coworker but a good friend. He will be missed by everyone," said Kevin Scheidler, CVEC line superintendent. Keith up into the air about 15 feet. He went up and down twice into a creek below before letting go. And if you ask him, I'm sure he would remember it!"

Keith feels the same appreciation for CVEC that has been shared about him. Keith explained, "When the co-op offered to send me to apprenticeship school in 2010 it was one of the greatest things that could've happened. It gave me the open

happened. It gave me the opportunity to do linework alongside the crew, which was something I always wanted to do. I am so grateful for the opportunity."

In retirement, Keith plans to continue to fish the Great Lakes with his family.


