ANNUAL MEETING FILLED WITH FIRSTS

wintery mix of snow and ice wasn't enough to keep members of Chippewa Valley Electric Cooperative (CVEC) from attending the annual meeting Tuesday, March 26. Despite the inclement weather, about 300 members and guests ventured out to gather at the coop's headquarters in Cornell for what Board Chairman John Petska termed a "milestone meeting." Summerfield also thanked CVEC for everything it's done to bring high-speed internet service to the area through Ntera, the co-op's joint venture with Citizens Connected. Ntera installed its 2,000th customer at the start of the year and continues to expand.

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Veering from its traditional Saturdaymorning format, CVEC held its first-ever evening annual meeting, preceded by a casual sandwich dinner served by cooperative employees and featuring a streamlined program. Petska explained the changes were made to attract a more diverse crowd.

In addition, this was the first annual meeting of Russ Falkenberg's tenure as CVEC's president/CEO. Falkenberg assumed the president/CEO role last spring following the retirement of Dean Ortmann.

Special guests at the event included State Senator Jesse James and State Representative Rob Summerfield, both of whom addressed the crowd regarding the recent closures of health care in the Chippewa Valley and remained at the meeting all evening, talking with members afterward.

Petska's chairman's report reflected the annual meeting's theme, "7 Strong," based on the seven cooperative principles. He reviewed many highlights of the past year which exemplified the co-op principles, particularly the seventh— Concern for Community. He noted this key principle was on full display in 2023, culminating with the co-op, along with Dairyland Power Cooperative, providing financial support for a new helicopter landing pad in northern Chippewa County

Petska's chairman's report reflected the annual meeting's theme, "7 Strong," based on the seven cooperative principles. as well as assisting the Cornell Area Fire Department with a lowinterest loan for a new fire truck.

Petska also discussed changes in the electric utility industry that are impacting costs, focusing on the rising cost of

wholesale power. He explained that wholesale power rates have increased for the co-op 6.6% over the past two years, and material costs continue to rise. He added that Chippewa Valley Electric doesn't have large industrial loads to help absorb those costs, relying instead on mostly residential and seasonal loads. Petska discussed measures taken by the co-op to limit the impact of these cost increases on members, enabling the co-op to hold a residential rate increase to just 3%, with no changes to the facility charge.

The bottom line, he said, is "Your co-op remains financially strong, stable, and sound."

Members who attended received a special gift upon the meeting's adjournment: cherry and maple cutting boards engraved with the co-op's logo, handcrafted by Cornell Middle School and High School students under the direction of Tech Ed. teacher Mr. Jaenke.

May is Electrical Safety Month

Electricity powers our lives, but it can also be dangerous if not treated with care. May is National Electrical Safety Month—a time to focus on the importance of electrical safety



and the steps we can take to prevent accidents. Here are a few tips to help keep you safe as you head outdoors this spring:

- Look up and keep yourself and any objects at least 10 feet away from overhead power lines.
- Always use extension cords marked for outdoor use when plugging in outdoor power equipment.
- Make sure all outdoor outlets are GFCI (ground fault circuit interrupter) protected.
- Keep kites, toys, and drones far away from overhead power lines. If a toy or drone gets caught in power lines, never attempt to retrieve it yourself.

Rate Adjustment

Chippewa Valley Electric Cooperative (CVEC) is committed to providing dependable and reliable electricity safely to its members while at the same time using our members' resources as wisely as possible. The continued goal of your cooperative's board of directors and management team is to keep rates and outage times low and service levels high.

Research states that since the start of 2021, food prices have gone up by 33.7%, shelter costs went up by 18.7%, and energy prices increased by 32.8%. As no surprise, wholesale power prices have increased through our supplier, Dairyland Power Cooperative, and a rate increase is necessary. Thankfully, CVEC is in a strong financial position and your board of directors can hold the rate adjustment at a 3% increase. This increase is for energy only, meaning the facility charge will not change. This adjustment will take effect on the billing statement members receive in May.
