
POWER IN PARTNERSHIP









CVEC and Dairyland Power assist Cornell Area Fire Department in purchasing a new fire truck

Chippewa Valley Electric Cooperative (CVEC), in cooperation with Dairyland Power Cooperative (DPC), provided low-interest loans to the Cornell Area Fire Department (CAFD). The loans were used to purchase a new fire truck that is already helping the CAFD to better serve the community.

Matt Boulding, fire chief for CAFD, shared that the truck was put into use to fight a fire just days after it was picked up. Cornell Area Fire Department services Cornell, Lake Holcombe, and

the surrounding area. The firefighting team typically responds to over 120 fire calls annually, plus accompanies EMS on additional emergency calls.

"I can't say enough positive things about the process of partnering with CVEC & Dairyland for this truck acquisition," shared Lisa Westman, Cornell Area Fire Department board president. "Not only was the rate significantly lower than anywhere else we had inquired, everyone was just wonderful to work with. It is clear how much CVEC & Dairyland care about the community & want to invest in its safety."

COOPERATION AMONG COOPERATIVES MAKES US ALL STRONGER

ike most electric cooperatives in the United States, Chippewa Valley Electric Cooperative (CVEC) serves a more rural area with fewer members spread out over more service territory than is typically found with investor-owned utilities (IOUs) and municipally owned utilities (munis). This can present problems when cooperatives are faced with large outages that span across their geographically large service area.

This is when we lean on each other. A great benefit of being a part of an electric cooperative is the mutual assistance program known as ROPE (Restoration of Power in an Emergency). In an incident where there are large outages across a cooperative's service area, fellow cooperatives step in and fill any gaps and help to restore power as quickly as possible for members.

Lineworkers who travel to assist other cooperatives through the ROPE program are compensated by the cooperative needing the extra helping hand. The program allows cooperatives to call in reinforcements during emergent situations without needing to pay the cost of having additional lineworkers on their team full time.

Just this year, we have had lineworkers from CVEC assist crews at Eau Claire Energy Cooperative and Alger-Delta Cooperative Electric Association to help restore electricity to members as quickly as possible during outages, knowing the favor would be returned if we ever faced large outages in our service area.

We are so grateful for the cooperative difference and the great partnerships we have.

CVEC crews have been working diligently to ensure the event, which is expected to bring over 45,000 visitors to the area, will be powered




