RETIRED CVEC LINEMAN AND CO-OP MEMBER BUILDS DREAM AIRPLANE FROM A KIT

ennis Harm worked as a journeyman lineman for CVEC for nearly 24 years, retiring in 2019. Throughout that time, he has been a member of the co-op living in rural Cadott. Since retirement, Harm has made more time for his hobby...flying. Harm's interest in flying was sparked at a young age. In fact, he even carved a plane from wood in shop class when he was young. His passion and interest for flying continued into adulthood, always having an interest in becoming a pilot. Back in 1976 Dennis started the process to earn his pilot's license. After life responsibilities got in the way, in 2003 he was able to complete the remainder of his needed hours and earn his pilot's license.

In the fall of 2015, Harm took the leap to purchase a kit and begin building his own plane. Harm had some exposure to others who built planes from similar kits from the Experimental Aviation Club he is a member of and from his brother's shared passion for flying.

"My brother started his build before I did. I helped him some and thought, well if he can do it, so can I," shared Harm.



Harm finished building his Vans RV-14A with a 210 HP engine in fall of 2021. "The most challenging part of the build were the fuel tanks," shared Harm. "Each rivet in the tank needed to be sealed so fuel wouldn't leak out. A messy and time-consuming process."

The plane kit in general was an ambitious project with over 15,000 rivets alone that needed to be installed by hand. However, the result was worth it.

Harm enjoys sharing his love of flying and aviation with others. Taking family and friends alike up in the skies with him.

CALL FOR BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Are you interested in serving as a Director for your Co-op?

CVEC is guided by a seven-person Board of Directors. All members of the cooperative and elected by YOU (our members). Each member district has the opportunity to vote for a representative on CVEC's Board of Directors every 3 years.

The Directors are YOUR voice and meet monthly to guide the direction of the cooperative. That's the cooperative difference!

Qualifications:

The main qualifications to serve as a representative on the CVEC Board of Directors are:

- 1. A CVEC member and primary resident of the district from which elected.
- 2. Not employed by or holding a financial interest in a competing enterprise or business selling electric energy or supplies to the cooperative.
- 3. Not employed by the cooperative.
- 4. Compliant with the cooperative's nepotism policy.

How to Join CVEC'S Board of Directors

- 1. Review CVEC's Bylaws Located on evecoop.com
- 2. Identify Your District

Directors serve 3 year terms, alternating election years. Don't know your district? Call CVEC or refer to the back of your billing statement.

- 3. Get on the Ballot
 - Connect with the co-op to indicate interest in running and receive a candidate packet and get on the ballot.
- 4. Promote Your Campaign
- 5. Attend the Annual Meeting

Directors elected by members residing in their district at the Annual Meeting.

Duties and Responsibilities:

What does a director do?

A director represents all members (consumers) of CVEC and is responsible for annual budgets, rate schedules, approval of general policies, capital credit retirements, present bylaw amendment changes, delegating authority to the President/CEO to execute, carry out the daily activities of the cooperative and follow established policies. Directors' decisions are made in the best interest of the cooperative.

What is the time commitment?

Each director serves a three-year term. Directors can expect to be available 20-40 days each year for attendance at monthly board meetings, CVEC's annual meeting, training sessions, member events, educational seminars, and travel.

When does the board meet?

The board of directors typically meets the last Thursday of each month with meetings beginning at 8am and varying in length from approximately four to six hours. Directors also attend occasional other meetings and events.


Is there any compensation?

Directors are paid a per diem for each meeting attended as well as IRS-approved mileage.

The following districts are up for re-election in 2026:

District 3 – Township of Sand Creek, Dunn County; the north half of the Township of Auburn and the entire Village of New Auburn; the Township of Sampson; that portion of the Township of Birch Creek located west of County Highway E, Chippewa County; the Township of Dovre, Barron County

District 5 – The entire Townships of Arthur, Delmar, and Edson and that portion of the Township of Colburn located west of County Highway D; that portion of the Township of Goetz located east of State Highway 27, Chippewa County
